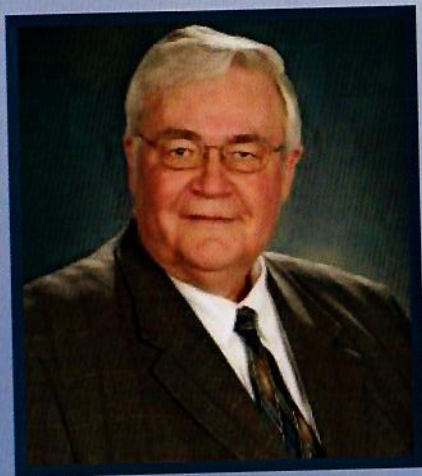

Dedication 2020



The 2020 Celebration of Students Program was dedicated to Dr. James Kinder. Throughout his 45-year career, Dr. Kinder dedicated himself to supporting and developing the careers of thousands of students, faculty, and staff. What makes his career extraordinary is his willingness to lead and nurture – “planting the seeds” of learning and of change whenever and wherever he was called to lead. Dr. Kinder became a Buckeye in 1975, as assistant professor in the Department of Animal Sciences.

In 1978, Dr. Kinder served as a faculty member at the University of Nebraska. In 1999, he returned to Ohio State and life as a Buckeye, where he was a leader of change. CFAES had recently restructured academic units, including a merger of the departments of Dairy Science, Poultry Science, and Animal Science into the current Department of Animal Sciences in 1995. Following four years of leadership by Dr. David Zartman, Dr. Kinder was asked to chair and lead this new department.

The success of that move began a chain of requests from the university to help reinvent other areas of OSU. During the transition from quarters to semesters, (2009-2012), Ohio State appointed him as the Chair of the Department of Human Nutrition in the College of Education and Human Ecology. EHE also asked him to be the Interim Director of the School of Physical Activity and Educational Services (2011-2012) during the realignment of programs in the College. Following this, from 2012-2016, Dr. Kinder served as the CFAES Interim Director at Ohio State ATI. Throughout these impressive accomplishments, Dr. Kinder also served as a visiting scientist at James Cook University in Queensland, Australia.

His research endeavors in Australia focused on microbial genomics and metagenomics. That partnership led to an annual study abroad, including tours of Australia for our Animal Science students beginning in 1994. His collaborations with colleagues from the Animal Welfare Science Centre and University of Melbourne in Australia also led to the development of an animal welfare curriculum and outreach effort by the Department. Where is Dr. Kinder now? Back in our Department of Animal Sciences pursuing his initial love - teaching introductory animal science courses!

Thank you, Dr. Kinder, for your leadership and boundless dedication to our students!

Dedication 2021

The 2021 College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences Celebration of Students recognition banquet is dedicated to Dr. Marilyn Trefz.

Dr. Trefz first came to Ohio State in 1973. While serving in secretarial and administrative assistant roles for various departments and colleges within the university, predominantly in the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences, she worked toward a Bachelor of Science in Home Economics Education. Upon graduation in 1983, she accepted a position as Adult Education Specialist at the Marion County Department of Human Services.

Trefz returned to OSU in 1985 as a Graduate Research Associate for Dr. L.H. Newcomb in the Department of Agricultural Education, conducting a research study to develop an assessment tool that measured levels of cognitive learning in tests and assignments for courses taught in the College. She received a Master of Labor and Human Resources in 1987 and accepted a position as Associate Director of Public Management Programs in the OSU School of Public Policy and Management.

Dr. Trefz received her third degree from The Ohio State University, a Doctor of Philosophy in Instructional Design, in 1991. From 1994-2001, she served as Co-Director of Project Reinvent, a comprehensive organizational change effort for CFAES, encompassing changes in faculty and staff reward guidelines, the introduction of student-centered learning, revision of College policies and procedures, and increased involvement of external partners in College programs.

As Assistant Dean of Organizational Development (2001-2006), Dr. Trefz developed and directed an ongoing organizational change program for the College and a new student recruitment program focusing on high school science teachers and students, particularly in urban and suburban school districts across Ohio.

Dr. Trefz retired from the College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences in 2006 and shortly returned part-time to the college as CFAES Program Manager. In that capacity, Dr. Trefz oversees and advises the student committee which plans and presents the annual CFAES recognition program.

As a 23-year advisor and mentor for the recognition program planning committee, Dr. Trefz holds a special place in our hearts. A quote by Bob Proctor describes her perfectly. "A mentor is someone who sees more talent and ability within you, than you see in yourself, and helps bring it out of you." Her wisdom, creativity, and enthusiasm are inspiring. This is her last year as an advisor, and she will definitely be missed!

Thank you, Dr. Trefz, for your outstanding service to students and the College!

Distinguished Senior Award - Honors students graduating in 2021 whose accomplishments and activities exemplify excellence in academics, research and innovation, service and involvement, and influence and leadership. Recipients are nominated by their academic unit. Sponsored by CFAES Academic Programs.

Rodney F. Plimpton Teaching Award – Recognizes an assistant or associate professor in CFAES who has demonstrated excellence in their field. It is named for the late Dr. Plimpton, an outstanding teacher in the Department of Animal Sciences. Sponsored by CFAES Academic Programs.

Newcomb Scholars – Awarded to students with the highest cumulative GPA at the end of Autumn Semester 2020. Five students in each rank 2, 3, and 4 on the Columbus and regional campuses and five second-year students at ATI are recognized. This award is named for Dr. L. H. Newcomb, retired Senior Associate Dean in the College. Sponsored by CFAES Academic Programs.

Jill A. Pfister Outstanding First Year Student Scholarship – Recognizes up to two first year students (freshman or transfer) who have shown outstanding leadership within a club or organization. The award is named for Dr. Jill Pfister, retired Assistant Dean for Academic Affairs. Sponsored by CFAES Student Council.

Ray A. Miller Council Scholarship – Recognizes current members of CFAES Student Council who demonstrate leadership and commitment to the success of Council. This award is named in memory of the late Dr. Ray Miller, retired Assistant Dean. Sponsored by the Miller family and CFAES Student Council.

Meritorious Service to Students Award – Recognizes individuals outside the University who contribute significant time and energy in support of our students and our academic departments. Sponsored by CFAES Student Council.

Outstanding Academic Advisor Award – This award recognizes excellence in undergraduate academic advising. Recipients are nominated by their advisees. Sponsored by CFAES Student Council

Student Organization Excellence Awards

Leadership/Professional Development – Presented to a student organization that actively promotes individual leadership skills and/or career development among its members, the campus, and/or the community, by sponsoring lectures or guest speakers, organizing retreats and workshops, or other leadership-related activities.

Community Engagement – Presented to a student organization that demonstrates the importance of serving the broader campus or external community through hands-on service activities, philanthropic or fundraising events or other community-related pursuits

Collaboration – Presented to a student organization that partnered with one or more student organizations or groups to develop a program, event or initiative to benefit the campus or community. This can be a single or ongoing program, event, or initiative.

Active Citizenship – Presented to a student organization that has demonstrated, through activities, a commitment to diversity and inclusion, advocacy and education, political involvement, socially responsible behavior, activism, participation in state, national or global associations, etc.

Mission of CFAES – Presented to a student organization that has supported one or more of the goals of the CFAES vision statement through activities.

Student Organization of the Year – Presented to a student organization in the College that has made extraordinary contributions over the past year to campus life in the College, the University and the surrounding community. Sponsored by CFAES Student Council.

Alpha Zeta Partners

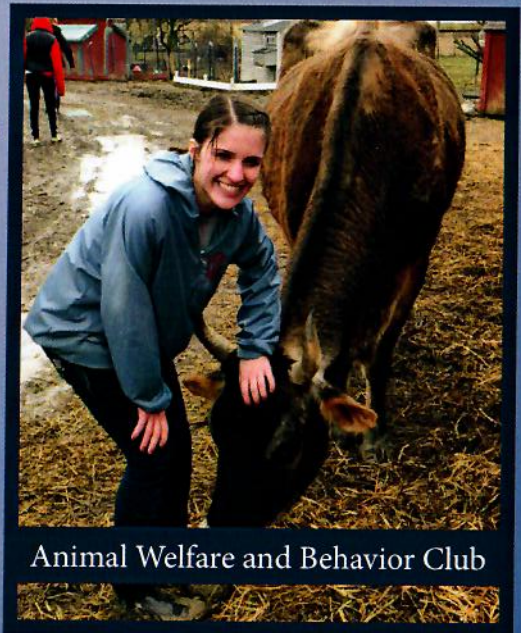

Pre-Vet Club

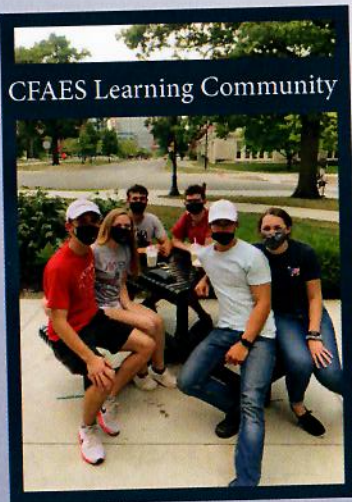
